
How is poverty defined?





In 2015, nearly 15 percent of Colorado kids lived in poverty (approximately 183,000 children)

fewer Colorado children in poverty in 2015 than in 2013






Structural barriers to opportunity mean that kids of color are significantly more likely to live in poverty than white children

Child Poverty Rates by Race/Ethnicity



Child poverty rates also vary by county


2014 Child Poverty Rates

Child Poverty in Denver



Looking at 200% FPL gives a better sense of how many children live in families struggling to get by.


Children Living Below 200% FPL, 2010-2014
