

## 2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION PREVIEW





### 2022 COLORADO GENERAL ASSEMBLY

- The 2022 legislative session began on January 12th, 2022 and ran for 120 days
- In 2020 the Colorado Supreme Court said Article V, Section 7 of the state Constitution, which sets the legislative session at 120 days, doesn't spell out that those days are to be consecutive and can instead be considered separate working days





## 2022 LEGISLATIVE MAKE-UP


- The General Assembly consists of 100 members 35 Senators and 65 Representatives
- Currently Democrats hold majorities in both chambers: 20 D vs 15 R in the Senate and 41 D vs 24 R in the House
- ✤ The magic numbers are 33 18 1





### 2022 LEGISLATIVE THEMES

- Delegating authority to state agencies, rule-making process
- Labor and employment
- Protecting the environment

### 2023 STATE OF PLAY: ELECTIONS

- The general election is on November 8, 2022. A primary was scheduled for June 28, 2022. The filing deadline was March 15, 2022
- The Colorado General Assembly is one of 88 state legislative chambers holding elections in 2022
- All 65 Colorado House seats are up for election, and 17 of the 35 Colorado Senate seats
- Republicans are unlikely to win back control of the State House of Representatives
- A road to the Executive Branch also looks increasingly difficult for Republicans, thought never-say-never

### **2023 STATE OF PLAY: NOVEMBER ELECTIONS**

#### **COLORADO SENATE**


Democrats control the Senate 20-15. They need to win 3 of the 7 possibly competitive seats to maintain their majority, in addition to holding their current seats.

#### COLORADO HOUSE

Democrats control the House 41-24. They need to win 5 of the 16 possibly competitive seats to maintain their majority, in addition to holding their current seats.

#### What's in play?

Democrats open with an advantage among statehouse seats that are either up for election this year or not considered competitive

But, among the many seats that could be competitive in November, there's plenty of room for Republicans to make gains

The state Senate stands a solid chance of flipping in the GOP's favor



### **2023 STATE OF PLAY: ELECTIONS**

- The Colorado Senate is where Republicans may have their best shot this year of taking back some control of state government from Democrats
- Democrats are guaranteed 12 seats, with 11 holdovers and one Democratic candidate running unopposed
- Republicans are guaranteed eight seats, with seven holdovers and one uncontested race
- Another five seats up for grabs in November are considered solidly Republican, while three are considered solidly Democratic.
- That leaves seven seats that are possible pick-up





### 2023 STATE OF PLAY: ARE ALL POLITICS LOCAL?

- In less than 100 days, Americans will head to the polls to vote in 35 Senate races, 435 House races, and a slew of state and local elections up and down the ballot
- The normal result, of course, is for the president's party to face a drubbing at the ballot box
- In the midterm elections since World War II, the party of the incumbent president has lost an average of 32 House seats and 4 Senate seats.
- "If you're explaining how recession calls are made, you're losing"
- Items polling well tend to be issues that favor Republicans: economy, crime, education, etc

## BALLOT INITIATIVES





### STATEWIDE #108—DEDICATED STATE INCOME TAX REVENUE FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROGRAMS


<u>Summary</u>: "Dedicates a portion of revenues (one tenth of one percent) from existing income tax revenues and allocates funds to housing projects, including "affordable housing financing programs that will reduce rents, purchase land for affordable housing development, build assets for renters, support affordable homeownership, serve persons experiencing homelessness, and support local planning capacity".

### Pros

### Cons

- + Provides dedicated funding for housing without a tax increase
  + Metro Denver and Colorado face a housing shortage, affordability a major concern for talent attraction and retention
- + Developers can benefit from these programs

- Puts affordable housing funding in hands of state, should be marketregulated
- -No guarantee funding will be spent as promised
- -The issue is red-tape, not access to capital





### STATEWIDE #58—ACCESS TO NATURAL MEDICINE

<u>Summary</u>: "Creates a natural medicine services program for the supervised administration of dimethyltryptamine, ibogaine, mescaline (excluding peyote), psilocybin, and psilocyn; creates a framework for regulating the growth, distribution, and sale of such substances to permitted entities; creates the Natural Medicine Advisory Board."



### Pros

### Cons

+ Already decriminalized in Denver

+ Deprioritizes growth and distribution of mushrooms for law enforcement, frees officers to promote public safety instead of policing this

+ Could create opportunities for future tax revenue, like in the case of marijuana

Allows residents to consume a dangerous drug known to cause schizophrenia and delusions
Could exacerbate the perception th Denver is a drug haven and contribu already record high drug use



### DENVER - NO EVICTION WITHOUT REPRESENTATION

<u>Summary</u>: This initiative establishes a fund within the City and County of Denver that provides legal assistance to tenants facing eviction. This initiative is funded through a \$75 annual tax on landlords. Would be funded with \$11,986,875 in tax dollars, which would rise based on the Colorado consumer-price index.



#### Pros

- + Creates housing security for tenants
- + Cost is minimal at \$75 a year (\$6.25 a month)
- + Keeps people out of eviction court, saving taxpayers money
- + Retains workforce needed in Denver

#### Cons

- Exacerbates housing unaffordability, cost of tax will be passed on to tenants
- Legal assistance fund would be overfunded: estimated to create \$12 million, but only \$1,200,000 is needed to serve tenants (12,000 evictions per year x about \$1,000 in legal fees per eviction)



## **DENVER- WASTE NO MORE**

<u>Summary</u>: "Waste No More would require all businesses including apartment buildings, condos, restaurants, hospitals, hotels and sporting arenas, to provide compost and recycling pickup services. It would also mandate that all construction and demolition waste must be properly disposed of and it would require recycling and composting at all city-permitted events."

### Pros

Cons

+ Colorado has an abysmal recycling rate, and this could help

+Creates access to recycling for residents living in apartments and condos

+ Protects quality of life and natural beauty that make Denver an attractive place to do business Cost burden is on businesses and condos/apartments (apartments most environmentally-efficient housing type)
Additional burden duplicative of recently passed policies
Mandate on business during a period of

economic recovery from COVID and possible recession





### **DENVER - DESERVES SIDEWALKS**

<u>Summary</u>: This program would remove the responsibility for repairs from adjacent property owners and place this responsibility on the City that serves every Denver neighborhood within 9 years and provide ongoing funding for sidewalk repairs.




### **Denver Water Facts**

- Established in 1918.
- Serving 1.5 million people (25% of state's population).
- Use less than 2% of water used in the state.
- Water supply comes from snowmelt in Rocky Mountains feeding the South Platte and Colorado Rivers.
- 4,000 square miles of watershed area.
- More than 3,000 miles of pipe.
- About 1,100 employees working across the state.
- 20 dams, 12 reservoirs, 4 treatment plants and 18 pump stations.










### **Denver Water Collection System**



- Spans multiple watersheds on both sides of the Continental Divide.
- System is imbalanced – 80% collected on the south end.
- Amount of water from each watershed can vary from year to year.







## The Colorado River



"Bathtub ring" at Lake Powell

- Denver Water gets 50% of its water supply from the Colorado River.
- Denver Water's future tied with six other states in the Colorado River basin that share river water rights.
- Unprecedent drought now in its third decade.
- Continued drought could lead to cutbacks in amount of Colorado River water states can use.



## Conservation and efficiency:


- Denver Water has been a leader in conservation since the early 2000s.



# SB21-072: Modernizing CO's Transmission Grid


Provide a pathway for Colorado to join a regional transmission organization (RTO)


- Transparency and competition that ultimately drive down power prices for customers
- Impartial, non-profit, independent entity to manage, operate, and optimize the Western grid


Create the Colorado Energy Transmission Authority (CETA)

- Prioritize the adoption of renewables and local jobs










# **Recent State Action**



## Colorado (SB 72)

- → Defines an Organized Wholesale Market (OWM) and requires utilities to join an OWM by Jan. 1, 2030, or waiver from the PUC
- → Establishes new rules & 240-day deadline for Colorado PUC review of Certificate of Public Convenience & Necessity (CPCN) for new transmission lines
- → Creates the Colorado Electric Transmission Authority (CETA)

## Nevada (SB 448)

- → Defines RTO
- → Directs NV Energy to join an RTO by 2030
- → Task force will submit first report by Nov 2022 and every two years




